Gose (2011)

Choc Beer Company - Krebs, OK

5.5% ABV. Signature Series, Annual Release, Available in 750ml Bottles

The German city of Leipzig is home to one of the world's most unusual styles: Gose (pronounced "goes-ah"), a tart wheat brew. Despite a centuries old lineage, this eclectic brew recently faced extinction. We pay tribute to this style's rich history by using premium German pilsner malt, wheat, a dash of coriander and salt. The sourness and dry finish are the perfect treat on a hot summer day.

Prairie Hop

Dry Hopped Saison

Prairie Artisan Ales - Tulsa, OK (brewed at Choc in Krebs)

7% ABV. Rotating release. Available in 750ml bottles.

Saison dry-hopped with Citra and Galaxy hops. I couldn't find much else of a description... This is brewed out of the Choc factory in Krebs, OK. It's only about 5-6 months old, but they're doing some really great stuff! Chase Healey is their brewmaster and just came back with about 8 barrels to do a rye saison. They've got some other stuff about to come out that looks fantastic, including a 13% Imperial Stout using coffee from Nordaggios (a local coffee shop that has amazing coffee). All these other beers have been good and interesting to try, but these have by far been my favorite and what I tell people about when they ask what I've been drinking lately.

El Cucuy

India Style Black Ale

Marshall Brewing Company - Tulsa, OK

8.6% ABV 80 IBU. Loco Gringo Series. Available in 22oz bottles.

In Latin American cultures, El Cucuy is an imaginary creature of the dark, similar to the boogeyman, which haunts the minds of children and adults alike. El Cucuy India-style Black Ale features dark roasted notes that sneak up on the subdued caramel malt backbone and the irresistible bitterness creating a harmonious and frighteningly delicious balance. But beware, this beer is dry-hopped providing an intensely vibrant floral and citrusy aroma and is not a monster to be carelessly dealt with. Be good or the Cucuy will get you!

Prairie Noir

Imperial Oatmeal Stout aged in Heaven Hill barrels.

Prairie Artisan Ales - Tulsa, OK (brewed at Choc in Krebs)

9% ABV. Limited release. Available in 750ml bottles.

Imperial Court Stout

Russian Imperial Stout with Raspberries

Mustang Brewing Company - Mustang, OK

9.6% ABV 34 IBU. February Seasonal. Available in 22oz bottles.

Imperial Court Stout is a hand crafted Russian Imperial Stout infused with a heavy dose of luscious raspberries. This rich, dark, malty beer has a fresh, fruity flavor that combines with and compliments the dark chocolate notes that carry through to the finish—like mixing raspberries and chocolate malt in a glass.

DNR

Belgian Style Golden Ale

Coop Ale Works - Oklahoma City, OK

10% ABV 30 IBU. Available year round in 750ml bottles and on draft.

The first big beer brewed in Oklahoma, DNR begins with central and western European malts that are skillfully blended with Noble hops from northern Germany. DNR provides flavor and aroma that is big in every way. Notes of dried fruit, cinnamon and vanilla make DNR a very complex experience to be enjoyed in moderation.

There were too many beers to send and too many for you all to taste in one show. So these are my suggestions based on what I think is good and unique to some of the breweries in Oklahoma, but they do not represent all the beers and palates in Oklahoma completely. With that said, I think you'll like most of what is being sent. Also, please choose any of the others beers as an alternative if you get one that has been hit by sunlight or is too old or if one just sounds more appealing than the other.

OK Beer Laws:

Homebrewing was legalized in 2010, requires permit ((American Homebrewers Association)

Any beverage containing more than 3.2% alcohol by weight or 4% alcohol by volume, that is, most liquors, wines, and typical beer, may only be sold in licensed liquor stores at room temperature.

It is illegal to sell packaged liquor (off-premises sales) on Sundays. Sales also are prohibited on Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, and Christmas Day, as well as on days when polling places are open and voting is taking place.[5] Low-point beer for consumption off-premises may not be sold between 2:00 a.m. and 6:00 a.m.

Beer samples cannot be sold at breweries, but there's a bill being considered to allow that.
